Communicate achievements – to public, policy makers and other sectors.







THE FIVE PILLARS OF THE ACTION PLAN

- 1. Sustainable wood consumption and production
- Patterns of consumption and production of forest products are truly sustainable.
- 2. The low-carbon forest sector
- The forest sector makes the best possible contribution to mitigation of, and adaptation to, climate change.

- 3. Decent green jobs in the forest sector
- The workforce is able to implement SFM and the forest sector provides decent jobs.
- 4. Valuation of and payment for forest ecosystem services
- Forest functions are valued and PES are established.

- 5. Monitoring and governance of the forest sector
- The forest sector policies and institutions promote SFM, policy making is evidence-based, and policy instruments are effective, efficient and equitable

A.4.3	Review and promote innovation intended to improve efficiency in the use of materials in the manufacturing and processing of forest products, and the competitiveness of the sector.	UNECE/FAO
A.4.4		Governments, stakeholders, forest industries and relevant stakeholders
A.4.5	Carry out studies on the current status of services related to forest products, and other marketable forest sector services, and their impact in terms of employment and value added.	UNECE/FAO, EFI, research organizations
A.4.6	Carry out research into the future social and economic drivers of forest sector services.	UNECE/FAO, EFI, research organizations
